








PART IV - INDICATORS OF ACADEMIC SUCCESS

1. Assessment Results:

This growth trend in mathematics is observed each year at every grade level and sub-group with the greatest increase occurring from 2005 to 2007. In this data set, sixth graders in 2005 soared from 61% meeting high standards in mathematics to 85% in 2007 as eighth graders. This 40% growth is attributed to the adoption in 2006 of a supplemental mathematics instructional program, Acaletics, the implementation of the school-wide instructional focus calendar, and a highly qualified instructional team.

SUBJECT: PRELIMINARY SUMMARY OF 2013-14 ELEMENTARY AND MIDDLE SCHOOL GRADES.

The Florida Department of Education (FDOE) released the 2013-14 School Grades for elementary and middle schools today. This memorandum summarizes the School Grades results at the district, state, and school levels.

- Overall the District earned a grade of "B," an increase from a "C" in 2012-13.
- 51% of Broward's elementary and middle schools earned a grade of "A" or "B" in 2013-14 compared to 53% in the 2012-13 school year.
- 152 (67%) schools increased or maintained their school letter grade in 2013-14 compared to 90 (39%) schools in the 2012-13 school year.
- Nine schools improved by more than one school letter grade from 2012-13 to 2013-14, including Sunland Park Elementary (D to A), Plantation Park Elementary (C to A), Bair Middle School (D to B), Gulfstream Middle School (C to A).

James Griffin, principal at Lauderdale Lakes Middle School, is the only South Florida finalist for Florida's Principal of the Year Award.

"I was very shocked. It was unbelievable," Griffin said when he discovered he was nominated.

Griffin, who was nominated for his time as principal at Rock Island Elementary School in Fort Lauderdale, transferred to Lauderdale Lakes in Fort Lauderdale this school year.

Before transferring to Lauderdale Lakes, he was principal at Rock Island for three years and assistant principal at North Andrews Gardens Elementary School in Fort Lauderdale for four years. Griffin began his career in education in 1993 as a fourth-grade teacher. The winner of the state award will be announced in January and will receive a monetary prize to go with their award. Griffin is up against five other nominees.

Florida chooses its nominees based on skills that include instructional leadership, managing the learning environment, accountability, assessment, community and stakeholder partnerships, decision-making strategies, technology, diversity and ethical leadership. Previously, Griffin was nominated as a Broward Schools Assistant Principal of the Year.

80 schools drop one letter grade 5 percent go up

Fewer A's. Less money. More failing schools.

The Broward School District faces difficult times as it contemplates this year's FCAT grades: 23 D and F schools, and 80 more dropping at least one letter grade, according to statistics released Friday by the Florida Department of Education. It is a drastic drop from last year, when there were just seven D schools and no F's.

"In my 33 years, this will be the toughest year to bounce back from," said Interim Superintendent Jim Notter. "There's only so long you can do more with less."

Meanwhile, more is at stake: poor grades mean less state bonus money for schools and teachers.

Districts throughout the state fared just as poorly. Out of more than 2,800 public schools in Florida, the number of F's quadrupled, from 21 to 82-an expected result from tougher standards on the Florida Comprehensive Achievement Test.

"This was of course the result of the state's efforts to raise the bar," said Florida Commissioner of Education Jeanine Blomberg. "This is not new news for anyone. I think what's really important is that each time we raise the standards, we have the same situation."

The test is given to third through 11th-graders and measures student achievement in reading, math and writing. About half of the letter grade also depends on how well <u>students</u> do from one year to the next. This year, science results of 5th-, 8th- and 11th-grade students counted for the first time, as well as math scores from the lowest achieving students.

There were some exceptions, however, to Friday's bad news. The highest grade leap was Sanders Park Elementary in Pompano Beach, which went from a D to an A.

"I just have to tell you, going from a D to an A is the best feeling you can possibly have," said first-year principal Fabian Cone. "I'm doing the happy dance."

Cone founded chess, math and science clubs, as well as held a spelling bee competition. FCAT camps were held before school, after school and on Saturdays.


"It's not a magical program we put in place," he said. "The teachers believed in the program. I knew were going to be an A because we worked hard and we worked smart."




ACALETICS® Subgroup Gap Analysis - Math

Commissioner Winn Announces Top Schools for Making Progress Schools recognized for improvement during 2005-2006

TALLAHASSEE - Education Commissioner John L. Winn today announced the top schools in Florida for making

progress in student achievement. Schools recognized for progress were honored for the highest increase in total points for school grades when compared to last year. "Honoring schools with the greatest gains in student achievement highlights the extraordinary progress made

with many of Florida's most struggling students," said Commissioner Winn.

The top 100 elementary schools, 75 middle schools, 50 high schools, and 50 combination schools were recognized for making the most year-to-year progress in school grade points. This recognition is for schools that had the highest increase in the total points a school received on the school grading criteria for the 2005-2006 academic year compared to the previous year. Broward County and Polk County each have two elementary schools in the top 10. Broward County and Miami-Dade each have three middle schools in the top 10. Broward County has four high schools in the top 10. Orange County has two combination schools in the top 10.

Of the top 10 schools statewide (elementary, middle, high and combination schools), Broward County has three schools on the list. In addition, more than half on the list (six schools) are charter schools.

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Florida State Board of Education to Honor High-Performing Principals

TAMPA — The Florida State Board of Education tomorrow will honor middle school principals who improved their school's grade by two or more letter grades this past school year. Since 1999, when the A+ Plan for Education was implemented, schools have improved from only 515 schools earning an "A" or "B" to 2,077 schools in 2006 — four times the number of high-performing schools seven years ago and 234 more than last year (up from 1,843). Three of every four Florida schools were considered high performing in 2006.

"The leadership and dedicated efforts of these principals are worthy of our recognition and praise," said Education Commissioner John L. Winn. "The key component in education reform is leadership, and these principals clearly exemplify that trait."



State officials had predicted the Daytona Beach school -- where most students are minorities and from low-income families -- would get only an F because of the increased difficulty of last spring's Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test.
